
Sticking with programs that do not work: the role of escalation of commitment in schools

"This study introduces escalation of commitment as a theoretical framework for understanding why school administrators may stick with ineffective programs and practices. Escalation of commitment is a robust decision-making bias in which people feel compelled to continue with a course of action even when performance indicators suggest it is not going well."

Getting to Institutional-level Change

"Schools are organizations and institutions. To effectively lead change, we must account for both of those elements. Schools are expected to be both stable and adaptable—resistant to change and ready to embrace it to meet students' needs. Because of this paradox, researcher Adonius Lewis argues, school leaders must focus on relationships at all levels to ensure sustainable school- and district-wide improvement."

Increasing Equity in Education through Stagebased Implementation of Universal Design for Learning in a Multi-tiered System of Support


